We were on board Essex class carriers in Charleston, SC the Yorktown CV-10, and in Corpus Christi, TX the Lexington CV-16 that were the same class as LEYTE. Now for this reunion we have included the hotel reservation information and the LEYTE Registration form and tour information. I urge you to make your hotel reservation as soon as possible and to fill out all the information on the LEYTE Registration form and get it back to Bill McQueary so that we can finalize arrangements. As you can see, the reunion will be held at the Valley Forge Embassy Suites located just 10 minutes from Valley Forge National Park. The hotel features 2 room suites, the bedroom includes a king size bed, the sitting room has a sleeper couch. There are a limited number of rooms that have 2 beds in the bedroom (10) so reserve early if this fits your needs and the hotel will try to accommodate, on available basis. There is a full complimentary breakfast and a Managers reception (Happy Hour) in the late afternoon. A special web site has been set up to

make it easier to register or call the hotel to register and be sure to mention "USS LEYTE CV-32 ASSOCIATION REUNION". For extended stay and additional questions see the hotel information in the Registration package for details.

For those members flying in or arriving by train there is **NO** hotel courtesy transport. You will have to inquire about transport to Valley Forge (Super Shuttle) if planning an extended stay a rental car may be the least expensive. There will be details on driving located elsewhere in the Newsletter.

Other than scheduled tours, eastern PA has a lot to offer, those interested in Civil War history, Gettysburg national Park is about 40 miles west of Valley Forge. For those who wish to visit a Navy ship, the battleship New Jersey is open 7 days a week, and located across the Delaware River at Camden, NJ. You must be able to climb up and down the ladders and there's a fair amount of walking. For those who like to shop I suggest Peddler's market located about an hour's drive north of Philadelphia in Bucks County.

I WAS A SAILOR ONCE

** I liked the sounds of the Navy – the piercing trill of the boatswain’s pipe, the syncopated clangor of the ship’s bell on the quarterdeck, the harsh squawk of the IMC, and the strong language and laughter of sailors at work.

** I liked sailors, officers and enlisted men from all parts of the land, farms of the Midwest, small towns of New England, from the cities, the mountains and the prairies, from all walks of life. I trusted and depended on them as they trusted and depended on me – for professional competence, for comradeship, for strength and courage. In a word they were “shipmates”; then and forever.

** The work was hard and dangerous the going rough at times; the parting from loved ones painful, but the companionship of robust navy laughter, the “all for one and one for all” philosophy of the sea was ever present.

** I liked the sudden electricity of “General Quarters, general quarters, all hands man your battle stations,” followed by the hurried clamor of running feet on ladders and the resounding thump of watertight doors as the ship transformed herself in a few brief seconds from a peaceful workplace to a weapon of war – ready for anything.

** I liked the bugle call to flight quarters, the rush of colored shirts to stations and the pilots in their special suits and helmets running to man their planes. The swoosh and thud as catapults sent each aircraft on their way and the welcome trap after each successful flight.

** I liked the traditions of the Navy and the men and women who made them. I liked the proud names of Navy heroes: Halsey, Nimitz, Perry, Farragut, John Paul Jones and Burke. A sailor could find much in the Navy: comrades in arms, pride in self and country, mastery of the seaman’s trade. An adolescent could find adulthood.

** In years to come, when sailors are home from the sea they will still remember with fondness and respect the ocean in all its moods – the impossible shimmering mirror calm sea and the storm-tossed green water surging over the bow. And then there will come again a faint whiff of stack gas, a faint echo of engine and rudder orders, a vision of the bright bunting of signal flags snapping at the yardarm, a refrain of hearty laughter in the wardroom and chief’s quarters and mess decks.

** Gone ashore for good they will grow wistful about their navy days, when the seas belonged to them and a new port of call was ever over the horizon.

** Remembering this, they will stand taller and say **“I was a sailor once and I would do it again”**

GETTING TO THE HOTEL

Arriving by Air: There is a Super Shuttle by the name of ‘Tropiano’ 215-616-5370 that can be contacted for reservations, approximately \$29.00 per person or if using rental car there is all the major car companies. Suggest if you can coordinate with other shipmates arriving at the same time.

If you are driving: Please refer to Map!

(a) You will want to get on I-76 West and go to exit 328A, Valley Forge/West Chester/US-202 South for approximately 3 miles to Chesterbrook Blvd. exit. At the top of the exit ramp make a right, the hotel entrance is on the right.

To get to Interstate 76 from:

(b) Delaware and Southern Points: Take I-95 North to I-476 North. Go approximately 17 miles to exit 16B Valley Forge/I-76 West. Go to (a).

(c) Philadelphia and Airport: Take I-95 South (toward Delaware) approximately 4 miles to I-476 North and go approximately 17 miles to exit 16B Valley Forge/I-76 West. Go to (a).

(d) From Schulykill Expressway (route I-76) and center city Philadelphia: Take I-76 West to exit 328A. Go to (a).

(e) From Pennsylvania Turnpike: Take exit 326 Valley Forge/King of Prussia. After toll booth take exit 328A. Go to (a).
